

Beads, Beads, Beads...

Beads are one of the most important parts of Mardi Gras. How many is enough? If you toss conservatively and that is hard to do, you will need a minimum of 10 gross for the Big Parade (Saturday) and Fat Tuesday Parade. Some, however, find that you need at least 15-17 gross. There are also other events throughout the year that need beads such as the Barn Bash, the KOA party during the second weekend of Mardi Gras, 4th of July Parade and the Trolley Party—to name a few. So it's wise to buy enough for the entire year. Beads from KOA members must be a minimum of 33" long. They may be ordered online or by telephone from several suppliers in the Baton Rouge/New Orleans area. Online searches for "Mardi Gras beads" will give several company and suppliers in the area, and you may order online, request printed catalogs, or visit the stores. Past experience is that most beads are shipped and arrive at your home in 4-7 days. If you decide to travel to the suppliers to purchase the beads, be sure to check store hours. Other throws may be used during the parades, but remember that throws that are too light, may blow backwards or under the floats. Throws that are too heavy have a tendency to hurt the crowd. And, please remember not to throw anything while the float is stopped. The crowd has a tendency to get close to catch throws, and the float driver cannot see them. You might create the possibility of injury to the crowd, and neither of our parade routes have barriers to keep people away from the floats. (Submitted by Stella Bennett)
